LETTER FROM OUR LEADERSHIP

It is Adelante's mission to alleviate poverty in Honduras through empowering underserved women. When we set out on this journey 23 years ago, Honduras was reeling from the devastation of Hurricane Mitch that killed over 7,000 people and left 20% of the Honduran population homeless. The economic growth of the country was set back by decades and the majority of Hondurans continue to live in poverty.

Today, thanks to our incredible team and community of generous donors, we have helped thousands of women annually to start and grow small businesses, empowering women to generate wealth, support their families, and experience a greater quality of life. With a loan portfolio of over \$2 million, an average repayment rate of 97%, and nominal interest rates, we are 100% operationally self-sufficient. We are proud of what we've achieved, and yet there is still so much to be done to increase women's financial inclusion and economic self-sufficiency. We continue to raise funds to provide microloans to more women and expand our financial literacy education offerings to increase our clients' chances of business success.

Our team will continue to do everything we can to serve more vulnerable women, and we know we cannot do it alone. Join us as we reach more deserving women and their families — with greater impact and more milestones to celebrate. Together, we can support enterprising women in obtaining the resources they need to thrive financially, personally, and holistically.

MICROLOAN PRODUCTS



Solidarity Group Loans



Groups of 3 to 8 women receive loans and assume responsibility of payment of their own loan, and they collectively take responsibility of paying the entire group loan.



Working Capital

Providing new and previous borrowers loans ranging from \$100 - \$1,500 to start and grow enterprises.



Home Improvement

Intended for borrowers who have businesses out of their homes or need improvements like a new roof or better flooring to improve conditions that support the efficacy of enterprises.



Water & Sanitation

Loans for subsidized latrines, sinks, and biodigesters to increase entrepreneurs' productivity and ensure healthy sanitary conditions at home and the workplace.

MICROLOAN PRODUCTS

Agriculture



Supporting women farmers and small rural producers with microloans and mentorship to diversify crops and improve productivity with longer lending cycles.



Education

Small loans for school uniforms, supplies, and transportation for the children of clients.

Adelante works in some of the poorest communities of Honduras, providing women with access to capital and financial services to improve their lives and lift themselves out of poverty.

Women & their families become more resilient to external shocks when they have stable income and savings.




When women have stable income, families are able to remain in the places they live and work


OUR IMPACT

YOUTH AMBASSADOR PROGRAM



With the help of several young people hailing from multiple states and countries, Adelante launched a program to meaningfully engage youth to advance projects in Honduras.

Two dozen visitors came to Honduras to accompany staff and experience Adelante projects and meet Adelante clients in person. Adelante now regularly conducts week-long and two-to three-day impact tours in various regions.

AGRICULTURE

Due to challenges associated with Covid in 2020 - 2022 Adelante significantly reduced agriculture microloan products, our highest risk loans. In 2023 we re-introduced agriculture loan products and experienced a 98% repayment rate.



With an agriculture loan from Adelante, she purchased products to make her twelve potato fields more productive. Reyna not only succeeded in doing that, she also invested profits and took an additional loan out with Adelante to purchase five cows. Reyna has hired a few neighbors and now has a thriving side business selling milk and dairy products. Although busy, she is excited to see the positive impacts on her family.


Adelante agriculture loans are our highest risk loans because there are often additional factors that are out of the control of the borrowers that can impact crop yields, income, and ability to repay such as the weather. In 2023 Adelante targeted potato farmers because there was an intermediary crop company offering supposed low cost products, but lending farmers money at high interest rates and requiring exclusive sales. All women deserve financial inclusion and opportunities to start and grow business enterprises without becoming indebted to predatory lenders. When women and their families succeed, they are able to reinvest profits and experience greater health and well-being outcomes

Adelante finances in Honduras are audited annually and every other year in the U.S. Our IRS forms are posted on our website. We have the Platinum Seal of Transparency through GuideStar, also known as Candid, the world's largest source of nonprofit information.
